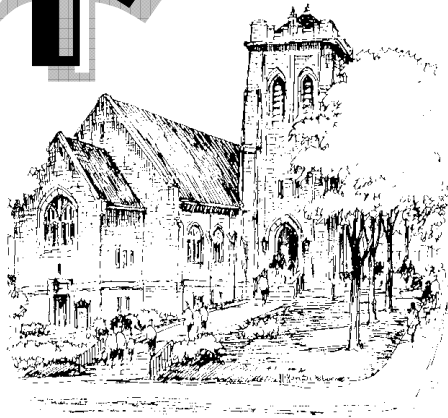

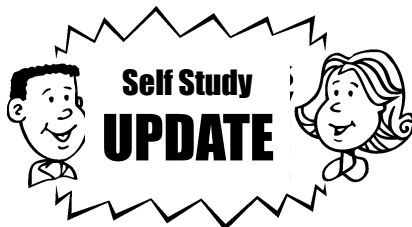

## Update from the Self Study Committee

We are working hard to understand how State College Presbyterian Church has been, is, and could be church in our community. As most of you know, we conducted a survey during the worship services one Sunday in early May to get a snapshot of who makes up our church, what you think about how we are currently doing as a church, and what you are looking for as we head into the future together. The results of this survey are under review by the self study committee. Once this committee has had a chance to more fully understand and interpret the results, they will be available for the congregation to view via a link on the church's website (scpresby.org) as well as in hard copy form in the church office.

We would like to once again emphasize that the survey was only one of many ways we will be interacting with you, the members of SCPC, to gather information. While we were awaiting the survey results, we were not idle. We have met with staff members to gain their unique perspectives. We are in the process of talking with leaders in the State College community who interact with SCPC on a regular basis and/or who can provide this committee with different outlooks about the community in which SCPC is situated. In addition, we are talking with members who are living at Foxdale Village, Brookline, and the Village at Penn State, who could not provide their opinions to use through the survey.



Looking forward, we are planning open forum, small group meetings to get feedback from you. Look for announcements in the upcoming weeks about when these will be and plan to attend one so we can hear from you.

Finally, we would like to remind you that we would love to hear from each of you about your view of our church and how we should move forward. ## From the Adult Education Committee



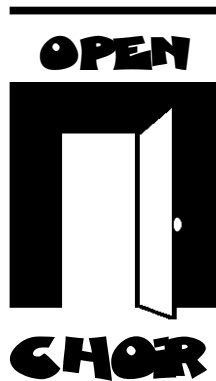

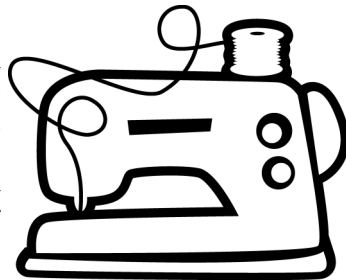
## September 11th Anniversary

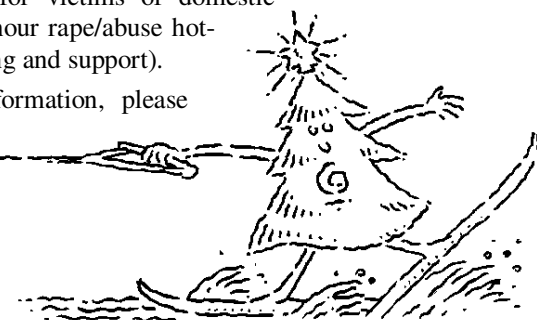


## Christmas in July-We Need Your Help!

From mid-July through early August, the Mission Ministry Unit is sponsoring our annual Christmas in July effort to support local shelters and our own Stay & Play program with needed supplies. Please help us by providing some of the items and supplies requested by these programs. The items are listed on the bulletin boards outside Susan Reisinger's office. Most are household items as well as personal care supplies. If possible, we'd like you to deliver the items to the shelter so that we can strengthen our personal connection to these programs. If you're unable to deliver your supplies, you may drop them off in the boxes outside the church office and at the parking lot door. Be sure to attach the item tag to your donation.

The shelters we assist are **Centre House** (bridge housing, emergency shelter for individuals and families and budget counseling); **Stepping Stone** (providing youth with supportive environment to learn independent living skills); **Stormbreak** (providing secure and supportive crisis shelter for females); **Zerby Gap** (residential program of Centre County Youth Services Bureau); **Burrowes Street Youth Haven** (runaway youth shelter); and **Centre County Women's Resource Center** (24 hour shelter for victims of domestic violence, 24 hour rape/abuse hotline, counseling and support).

## Spirit of the Arts

Join Kim Hunziker on Saturday, July 16, 9:00 AM for an open ended hands-on experience "using the process of SoulCollage® as described in Seena B. Frost's published works about SoulCollage®. Using SoulCollage® as developed by Seena B. Frost, a person creates a deck of collaged cards from found images. The cards are arranged in suits for the primary purpose of self-exploration and self-acceptance. SoulCollage® cards are collaged from images found in purchased or donated magazines, calendars, books, cards, etc. and from stock photos and/or personal materials (e.g., photos, one's own art)." (www.soulcollage.com & for more information) The SoulCollage® cards can also be used to enter into prayerful reflection and significant engagement with the Holy Spirit.

We will begin with a brief introduction to the process at 9:00 AM, then participants are invited to stay until 3:00 PM, or to come and go as they please. Plan to bring print material to cut up and to share. You are also welcome to bring favorite adhesives, scissors, markers, etc. All supplies needed for the process will be available on site. This is a very simple, easily accessible process. No "artistic talent" is necessary – only the skills of cutting and pasting are required. ## Men's Rites of Passage

This fall the Center for Action and Contemplation will offer a Christian men's rites of passage at the Frost Valley YMCA in Claryville, NY, September 21-25. Joel will be the principle teacher for the event, now being offered in locations around the globe. The program is a five-day / four night deeply prayerful and soulful experience that builds on the classic patterns of male initiation through simple and moving rituals and teaching. Each day includes group prayer, major teachings on central masculine spirituality themes, quiet time for reflection, and sharing in the context of a "home group." In the words of the program's founder, Fr. Richard Rohr, our November Henszey Lecture Series speaker, "All participants begin at point zero with no agendas to live up to or down to. All that is required is for a man to come with a 'beginner's mind' and the readiness of a young novice seeking wisdom." This is not about religion, but about spirituality, about age old traditions that guide us into manhood, about coming to trust that there is something much greater at work in our lives than we could ever imagine. ## Meditation Garden and Columbarium

While SCPC might lack vast expanses of grassy knolls and playgrounds for our young children, we DO have a wonderful courtyard (just outside the social hall) and a beautiful meditation garden outside of the parking lot entrance. This meditation garden was built to accommodate a most important feature of the church, the columbarium, which is a wall of niches that can be purchased much like a plot in a cemetery to hold "cremains" (the ashes of a cremation). The garden area provides a quiet place for reflection. The columbarium and the meditation garden were set up with the vision and direction provided by Jim and Sue Powers. The price for each niche provides resources for both the upkeep of the garden and for the establishment of fund to support the mission efforts of the church. ## Let's Discuss Applause in Worship

In recent weeks and months many of you have made your thoughts on applause in worship known to me and to the Worship Ministry Unit. First, I want you to know that many, many churches are having this same discussion. Second, I have been pondering this issue and how to thoughtfully address the issue. I do not have the answer and I don't want to dictate policy, I just want us to discuss what we do in worship. While searching the internet to see what other churches and church musicians were saying, I came across this blog entry by Kenneth Dake, the Director of Music at the Marble Collegiate Church in New York City. I think he addresses the issue very well. I emailed Ken to get his permission to use his words and we've shared a few emails about the issue since. I've done some editing to make it fit our congregation – my comments are in italics.

### What's Wrong with Applause in Worship?

Applause is certainly no sin! In rare instances it is highly appropriate, as for the retirement of a beloved minister or the welcoming of a new one. But when routine applause becomes the norm I believe we are robbing ourselves of the precious sacredness of this hour of worship, which truly is holy time, set apart from every other hour in our week.

I don't mean to sound ungrateful for all the gratitude and affirmation I and others receive. But I do believe that pervasive, routine applause during worship is:

- **A mood wrecker.** The music and the spoken word work together to create a sacred space, a transcendent moment. Applause robs us of experiencing the profound mystery and very real sense of Divine Presence in worship.
- **A message distracter.** It takes the spotlight off of the message and puts it on the messenger.
- **A peer pressurer.** Most people feel reluctant to spoil a moment that is pregnant with the Spirit, but a small handful of people often coerce everyone into the obligatory applause. It's a tyranny of the few, to be sure.
- **An ego confuser.** We in the choirs work hard to let go of our egos and our natural inclination to be performers in order to make Sundays less about us and more about ministry, about transformative worship, and about God. After all that inner work, applause can really mess with our heads, reawakening our craving for instant affirmation.
- **An inequitable rewarder.** *It seems that certain groups and certain types of music receive much of the applause.* There are so many members of the staff and congregation who deserve great recognition and overflowing gratitude for all they do; rarely do they ever receive it publicly.

### Ways to Redirect the Urge to Applaud

Here are six ideas for things we could try in lieu of applause. The first three can be practiced right in the moment, and the last three can be employed over time.

**Keep silence** After a word is spoken or an anthem is sung I encourage you to try sitting quietly with the moment, remaining fully present in the silence and fully open to hear whatever word God is speaking to you.

**Voice an acclamation.** Substituting a spoken acclamation for applause separates the church from any ordinary theater or concert hall. It redirects praise to God, the author of both the Word being preached and the Song being sung. And to hear such voiced acclamations are deeply affirming to the speaker or musician – much more so than applause.

**Say a prayer.** We need them! Prayer has far greater lasting value than applause, and by praying for the ministers and musicians you are giving a priceless gift of love and support.

**Send a note, voicemail or email.** I am so honored and humbled when people often write to me to say how the music touched them. Last week I received a Sunday evening email that began, "Today you were playing for me." That was such a generous, wonderful gift that sent me soaring through the start of my work week!

**Make a donation.** If you are a regular contributor to SCPC, you may make a note on the memo line of your check that "applauds" a ministry which has made a difference in your life, such as "In gratitude for the CYF ministry." Or perhaps you will feel inspired to make a one-time gift, thereby making a lasting difference in a particular ministry.

**Invite a friend to SCPC.** Invite someone to share with you that which has touched you deeply, inspired you to become more of the person God intends for you to be, and helped you forge deep bonds of friendship with others on the faith journey.

I'm not foolish enough to believe that we could or should keep applause totally out of worship. In that light, I'd like to close with a quote from Massanutten Presbyterian Church outside Harrisonburg, Virginia. You can find the complete document at <http://www.massanuttenchurch.com/ApplauseInChurch.pdf>.

We recommend that we make love our aim (I Cor. 14:1) in this matter:

(a) that those inclined to applaud do so only when they feel led to do so by the Holy Spirit as a need to identify with truth set forth in words said or sung by others and to express to God their joy or enthusiasm derived from that truth, recognizing that for some worshipers applause, even so motivated, may be offensive.

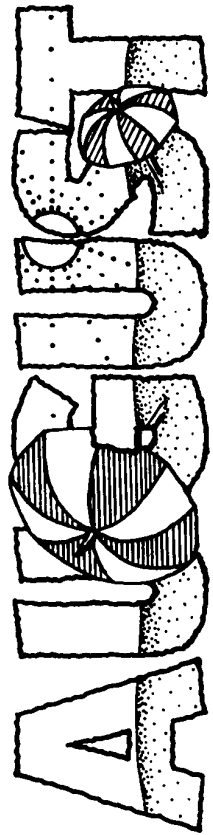
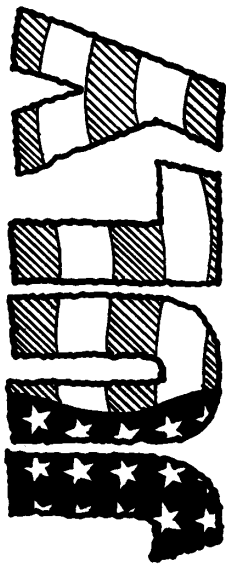
(b) That those who are offended by applause because it seems to them worldly or out of place in worship trust their sisters and brothers not to express themselves in this manner unless they who applaud believe themselves to be genuinely led by the Spirit in so doing, in which case their expression of enthusiasm can be honored and accepted as their gift offered to God in worship, but others need not feel compelled to join in unless so moved.

(c) That in the exercise of such "mutual forbearance in love" applause will neither be forbidden nor become so commonplace as to be expected and sought after by those leading in worship, and the Holy Spirit will guide us in "maintaining the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace."

Again, the purpose of this article is not to provide an answer or to suggest a policy - the purpose of this article is to get us to discuss this topic and to think about what we do in worship. Go ahead . . . discuss!
