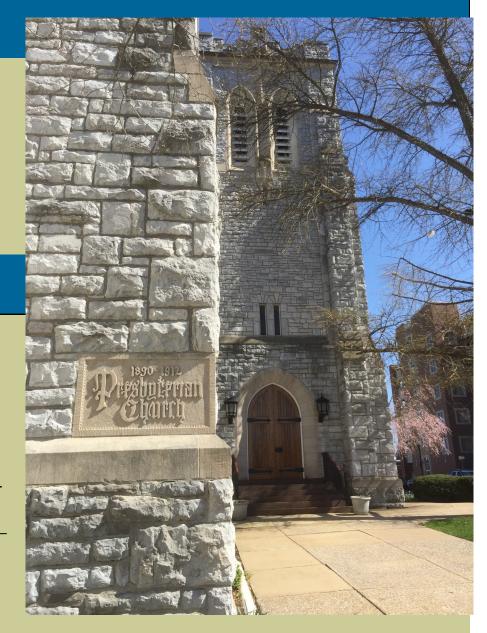

STATE COLLEGE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION AND THE CORPORATION JANUARY 29, 2017

The meeting was called to order at 10:07 am by Rev. Dean Lindsey. The Scripture reading was from Psalm 122.

The first verse of the Hymn "Great Are You Lord" #614 was sung.

Approval of Minutes: Lam Hood moved and Terri Thompson seconded the motion to approve the minutes of Congregational Meetings held on January 24, June 26, and November 13, 2016. The motion was **APPROVED**.

Rev. Lindsey reviewed the composition of the annual report and pointed out the amount of work required to put together the document. He thanked Martha Trout for coordinating the effort and everyone who was involved in writing the reports.

Report of Building Restoration Committee: Tom King, Chair

The campaign kicks off today. Tom summarized the many activities that take place in worship and in the building every week to serve God. The building is 103 years old and needs restoration, repair and renovation. The work that needs to be done has increased due to lack of funding and these items must be addressed. There are nine specific projects costing about \$800,000 that need to be completed now. Approximately \$200,000 will be needed for additional projects to be addressed over the next couple of years. A team of 16 members formed last summer to address this. An internal feasibility study was conducted that involved focus groups of members from various parts of the congregation. One meeting was held in October and one in November to determine if there was support to address the needs and if membership was inclined to support such a campaign. About 25 – 30 families participated. The feedback overwhelmingly was positive to address the building needs and to begin immediately. Late in 2016 gifts were received in advance of the campaign kick-off that totaled in excess of \$700,000, so about \$300,000 is needed to meet the million-dollar goal. The goal is to conclude the pledging phase on Palm Sunday which is 10 weeks away, and to have met the goal by then. A video was shown of church members explaining what the church means to them and why this project is important. Many thanks to Jerry Sawyer for putting together the video.

Don Hartzell, Chair of Building & Property Ministry Unit, explained the specific projects to be funded by the campaign. A handout was distributed outlining the cost of each item. The projects are:

- Stained glass windows: repair, restore, protect: \$230,000
- Sanctuary interior: renovate/upgrade (carpet and hardwood flooring, insulation, new paint/plaster repair, audio-video system): \$175,000
- Renovate education building: Stay & Play security, carpeting, windows, restrooms, insulation: \$185,000
- Reconfigure parking lot for safety (eliminate cut-through traffic): \$35,000
- Replace remaining lights with LED fixtures: \$10,000
- Renovate Social Hall and Kitchen: create more hidden storage space, brighten, repaint and recarpet, raise and hide duct work, more efficient kitchen design: \$130,000
- Renovate/upgrade Martin Room and kitchen: \$15,000
- Install acoustic abatement panels in Westminster Hall: \$5000
- Install limestone wall along W. Beaver Ave. sidewalk: \$15,000
- Create building maintenance reserve fund for upcoming needs including replacing air conditioning units and roofing: \$200,000

John Ikenberry, former MMU chair

John reminded the congregation of the tremendous impact the church has on this community, including Angel Tree, OOTC which served up to 20 people per night over two weeks, donations to local agencies, and Stormbreak renovation project planning; the building is a wonderful resource for us as well as the community. John asked for the congregation's support If they are able. Pledge cards are available at the rear of the sanctuary and a letter will be received in the mail this week. There will be an upcoming Adult Ed offering with more details about what is needed and how to support those needs. He invited the congregation to talk with any committee member about the campaign.

<u>Proposed Changes to Bylaws</u>: Bob Igo explained the changes. Session commissioned a task force to study committee structure and how we are organized. This was the administrative side of the Called Together process.

- We were not compliant with state regulations for incorporated non-profits, so President and Vice President/Secretary positions were added in addition to the Treasurer position. The new officers' only function is to sign contracts on behalf of the church corporation.
- The Clerk of Session is required to be a ruling elder by the Book of Order. This was extended to be not just a current ruling elder but any ruling elder; current service on Session is not required. Also, the term of office for church officers will begin on February 1 (elders and deacons) to give more time to nominate, elect and install officers. This will allow a smoother transition from one group of officers to the next.
- Internal Audit and Nominating Committees and Building & Property, Finance, and Personnel Ministry Units should be permanent, standing committees. Programmatic committees such as Mission and Worship Ministry Units will change over time. There was a question from the congregation about having standing committees in the by-laws, since that will require the congregation's approval to make a change in their composition. This was done because these committees "stand firmer" than just Session and thus are acknowledged by the congregation as being "permanent" committees.

Frederick Brown suggested that the changes be approved by acclamation: **APPROVED.**

<u>Presentation of 2017 Budget</u>: Bob Igo, FAMU chair: Bob acknowledged Brent Ambrose and previous committee members for an outstanding job refining policies to provide a good, solid structure in the budget/finance world of the church. They kept the budget within our means and engaged a local accounting firm for a professional review. New reporting procedures were implemented. Last year's budget was balanced. There were no questions about the current proposed budget. Don Hartzell made the motion and Richard Page seconded to accept the proposed budget: **APPROVED.**

The motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Bob Igo and seconded by Richard Page. Verse 1 of Hymn #733, "We All Are One in Mission" was sung. The meeting was adjourned at 10:50 am.

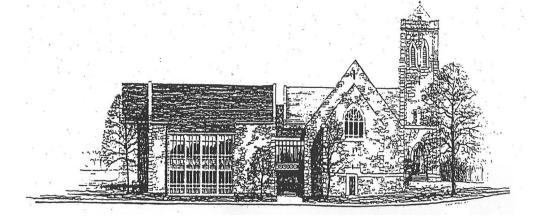

ANNUAL REPORTS OF THE OFFICIAL BOARDS

In the 2015-2017 Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church USA, Session is directed "to provide for worship and to encourage the people

SESSION ~ 2017

to participate fully and regularly in it. The Session shall make provision for the regular: a) preaching of the word, b) celebration of the Sacraments, c) corporate prayer, and d) offering of praise to God in song."

Session is composed of dedicated members of SCPC who have accepted responsibility for the governance of the church. These church officers are the Ruling Elders, who are ordained and installed for service. Our ministers also sit on Session and are known as Teaching Elders. Session meets monthly in the Social Hall, usually on the second Sunday evening of the month, except for July. Ruling elders typically serve a three-year term and are limited to six consecutive years of service. According to the Book of Order, ruling elders are elected by the congregation "to discern and measure its fidelity to the Word of God, and to strengthen and nurture its faith and life." Session consists of eight Ministry Units. Each ruling elder serves on one or two ministry units, which generally meet once a month. Reports from the individual Ministry Units are included in this Annual Report. Ruling elders also participate in the serving of communion and attend Huntingdon Presbytery meetings.

Significant events for Session in 2017 include:

- Recognition and reception for Sharon Kasting, who retired after 25 years of service to the church, first as Assistant Treasurer and then as Financial Administrator
- Successful completion of the "Restoring God's House" capital campaign
- Approval of contracts for sanctuary renovation including flooring and carpeting replacement, stained glass window restoration, painting and other updates
- Installation of a church-wide security system
- Memorandum of Understanding to provide office space for the Out of the Cold program administrator

THE BOARD OF DEACONS ~ 2017

The mission of the Board of Deacons is one of sympathy, witness and service after the example of Jesus

Christ. Our task is to serve the congregation and the surrounding community.

For 2017, the major fundraising effort of the Deacons continued to be the One Great Hour of Sharing Auction and Dinner, held in February. Half of the proceeds from the Auction were given to the national One Great Hour of Sharing at PC(USA) to assist those affected by natural disasters, provide food for the hungry, and to build strong communities. The remaining half is shared between the Social Justice and Mission Unit and the Deacons to continue supporting the work of the church. The Deacons decided to go forward and take a break from the auction in 2018 – keep your eyes open for announcements of new events to benefit the work of OGHS and Deacons!

As part of the mission, financial support is offered for the Pastors' Discretionary Fund, LOGOS, FISH and Krislund scholarships. The Deacons orchestrate the December Gracious Giving Market where hand-crafted items created by artisans and farmers throughout the developing world are made available to the congregation. Proceeds from this sale help to fund education and to eradicate poverty throughout the world. The Deacons once again supported the local Crop Walk and the State College Food Bank. Deacons also continued to support the community at large by providing funding for car repairs and other financial assistance for clients of the Women's Resource Center, assisting congregants in need, and helping refugees. Lastly, the Deacons joined the capital campaign effort for the church building and contributed some financial resources.

The Deacons have three units to share the responsibility of caring for the church: Caregiving, Mission, and Service. The Caregiving Unit provided meals for members of the congregation needing extra care, meals and study space for college students during exam weeks and rides to church for members without transportation. The Mission Unit delivered food to the Food Bank, and coordinated and participated in Work Days, in addition to offering assistance with other special mission projects in the church like the Crop Walk. The Service Unit managed successful and popular events such as the OGHS Auction, the Palm Sunday Breakfast, the Advent Soup Supper and the Gracious Giving Market.

Last, but not least, the Deacons are visible every week as they usher for church services. In the coming year the Deacons will be focused on fine tuning the fire alarm procedures, being trained on AED usage, and doing other safety assessments in conjunction with regular ushering responsibilities.

For myself, and on behalf of others rotating off the board, it has been a pleasure to serve the church for the last six years. Your Board of Deacons looks forward to serving SCPC in 2018.

After the large side windows are replaced sometime in March, we anticipate having a (re)dedication service of our sanctuary space, offering thanks to God for the beauty that inspires us in and through worship.

It will be wonderful when the dull plywood sheeting is completely peeled away and the light that shines through our windows is fully restored, but even in its absence, we have added a lot of color this Fall. Our Education Ministry Unit came up with such a creative idea to add prayer flags prepared by children, youth and adults in the empty window spaces, and many of our artists also presented a colorful display of the Jonah story for several weeks in November. We hope to do something similar with the Noah story in February.

There is an old story that has been told various ways about a young child who is dazzled by the beautiful colors of a church's stained glass windows which depict various Biblical figures, apostles, and saints from the past. Later when asked what a saint is, the child responds, "a saint is the one who lets the light shine through!" It is wonderful for me to be able to minister among so many who let the light of Christ shine through their lives: those who sing to the praise of God, who serve the homeless poor, and who teach children the stories of faith, just to name a few. We have also learned this year that even when the light around us seems a bit dim, we can still add our own colors, to make our church a place of welcome and joy.

As part of my annual report, I would like to commend the talented and caring church staff I get to work with every day, particularly those who are a bit behind the scenes. Janet Heasley, our Church Secretary, greets everyone with a smile, and even as she helps us prepare for worship, she keeps the office happy and well-organized. Martha Trout, our Membership and Program Associate, keeps us all up to date with regular communication through our weekly updates and web site while masterfully juggling many of the details of day-to-day church life. Michelle Fortin, our Financial Administrator and newest member of the staff, brings expertise and compassion to her position, and we are so glad to have her working with us. Our building and custodial staff has performed in outstanding ways through the recent renovations. Thank you, Greg Salokangas and Bob Jackson. Finally, I must offer the deepest gratitude for the officers of the church who are much dedicated to the well-being of the church and strive faithfully and prayerfully to lead us in the ways of Christ and to all of the members who generously give of themselves to help our ministries grow and thrive. ASSOCIATE PASTOR'S REPORT ~ 2017

A FISH *(Fellow Ship In Senior High)* leader said this to me recently as we were reviewing the year. Over the last couple months it has stuck with me like nothing else. Like the lingering chime of a bell in a big room, his words keep bouncing off other parts of life and coming back "I don't know what it is, I just have a heart for them. I don't know why, but I identify with them. It's like I see myself in this person who is completely different in every way and it makes me care for them more than I thought I could."

to me again and again. I'm beginning to understand why...

This is what it sounds like when Jesus enters the room.

This year, that leader and the student they are talking about both went on a hard journey. The kind that is full of tears and frustration and worry. The kind that gets at the core of who you are but without you realizing it until you look back on it later on. You know what I'm talking about, right? And even though they both had this experience in very different places, for different reasons, in different ways ,without knowing much of anything about the other, something connected them while at FISH. In the student's painful or vulnerable moments, this leader felt compelled to talk, walk or just sit with them in a way that surprised themselves and turned out to be healing for both. *"It's like I see myself in this person who is completely different in every way and it makes me care for them more than I thought I could."*

The middle of Psalm 42 the writer describes their unexpected experience of God by saying, "Deep calls to deep at the thunder of your waterfalls; all your waves and your breakers have gone over me. By day the Lord commands his steadfast love, and at night his song is with me, a prayer to the God of my life.

This year I have heard this song sung in the lives of people again and again, some of which started off wanting nothing to do with religion or a God at all. Yet, something within us is awakened by being a part of this community, compelling us to call out to each other and respond by singing along. Not our their lips, but with action, and choices as we try to, *"see myself in this person who is completely different in every way and it makes me feel the need to care for them more than I thought I could."*

As we all move into this next year and I try to honor the calling this community has given me as your associate pastor, I am beginning with a prayer. Not for more projects to get done or people to show up or anything else that can be counted in a report like this. Instead, it will be for the words of that FISH leader and the experience of the Psalmist it become more and more of our own. May we all come to recognizing more fully when "deep calls to deep" in us and respond by reaching out in the simplest acts of love for those completely different than us, being willing to sit down and know them better. May we commit ourselves to the mission of Christ lived out through creating longer tables instead of higher walls everywhere we go.

FISH (Fellowship In Senior High)

In March 37 students and leaders ventured to a new place for our Spring Break mission trip, "The Reformed Church of Highland Park" in New Jersey. While there we got to be immersed in this social justice focused worshiping community which included everything from meeting with refugee families, rebuilding homes destroyed by hurricane flooding, sharing meals with Chinese students, marching with Native American tribes, praying for families being separated by deported, painting, cleaning, making art and much more. It was an amazing week of helping, learning and connecting. This is why we will be returning again in 2018.

Wednesday nights have continued to be full of joy and energy with 25-45 youth joining us each week. A particularly large and energetic Senior class has also taken on more leadership through planning programs and other special events.

In June FISH returned to Assateague island with 53 people to spend an always memora-

ble week without electricity, warm showers or the promise that your tent won't be suddenly flooded in the night. It is that minimal lifestyle that also makes it such a special time as everyone comes together without life's distractions and finds God's blessing in each other.

LGBTQ Youth

In the last few years FISH has seen a sharp rise in youth who identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender or Queer (LGBTQ). This has helped us build a strong friendship/partnership with the "Centre LGBTQA Support Network". In December we hosted the first "Centre County LGBTQ+ Youth Summit" together which saw over 70 youth, parents, and speakers gather for a day of learning, sharing and exploring ways to support the LGBTQ youth in our area. The most exciting outcome of that time is the creation of a new monthly LGBTQ focused youth gathering on the 2nd Friday of each month in the church starting July 12th at 5:30 pm.

POLO (Parents Of Little Ones)

The POLO group continues to grow together with the 7-8 families who gather monthly for our "Night Out" fellowships, Dad's and Mom's gatherings and the deepening friendships that are growing between the adults and our children. This year we also had the first "POLO Family Camp" in September in which 7 families came out for a weekend of fellowship, child care supported couples time and focusing on how understanding our God Given personalities as individuals can help us navigate our relationships better too. In the end, every family said that it was an unexpectedly relaxing and renewing time that made the rest of life's craziness feel more joyful.

Mission

Much of my work in mission has been focused on partnering with community agencies to help expand the mission outreach of our community this past year. One example is in how we do prison ministry. At this time 10-15 members of this church are working with agencies in a variety of ways such as the "Pennsylvania Prison Society" to do visitations and help connect families at Rockview Correctional, "Bridge of Hope" to create visiting relationships at Centre County Correctional Institute or those writing to inmates as a pen pall. Another example is our partnership with "They Have Names" a group started by former FISH Kid Penny Efrig which worked to create a community wide refugee awareness campaign and help these families reunite after being separated between Syrian and German Refugee Camps. This was an effort that I am happy to say reunited 12 people this year. We also responded to the multiple hurricane disasters with Church world Service by collecting over 150 cleanup buckets worth of supplies equaling over \$6800 in much needed items to be sent to those rebuilding their lives. Not to mention continuing to partner with many agencies through our Christmas in July and Angel Tree projects, helping individuals like you get gifts and supplies to hundreds of those in need and the agencies to struggle to support them year around.

Lastly, this year the committee that oversees mission and outreach for the congregation chose to change it's name from the "Mission Ministry Unit" to "Social Just and Mission Team". It may seem like just a small issue of semantics, but the change of name is meant to reflect our focus on inviting and encouraging more members to join the team, because mission should not be something that church does, it should be what Church understands itself to be. We do not "do mission", we are a mission,

This is just a small sample of what I have been blessed to be a part of as the Associate pastor in this church and I am looking forward to much more, seeing what God has in store for all of us in 2018.

Blessings to all who are reading these reports at the beginning of this New Year! While it always seems like a chore to write, it actually is quite helpful to reflect and evaluate what programs I have worked in during the past year!

I resource the Education Ministry Unit, as well as the Adult Education Committee, the Congregational Fellowship Committee, and co-resource our growing LOGOS program (GECKOS and Chrysalis) along with Ned and Diana (Chrysalis). I enjoy working with Stay and Play, and Laura Steager, our Childcare Coordinator, and our fantastic kitchen coordinators for LOGOS and FISH – Mike and Amy Gordon. Here is a glimpse into some of last year's highlights for me:

In **January** we were kicking off the brand new **EXPLORE** program for Confirmation youth. Mike, Dean, Diana, and I spent many hours working ahead on this new program for joining the church, and it turned out to be a GREAT experience for all. The key to this new program: fantastic **MENTORS** that spent many hours meeting with the youth. Our plan is to have this wonderful program every other year, and target age is 9th and 10th Graders, but older youth will be welcome!

February is the month that we sponsored Kindergarten Night with our LOGOS program and that is always popular! **March** is when the LOGOS 4th graders assisted in leading worship, and that is always a special treat for me. Patt Campolongo and I enjoy teaching this age group about WORSHIP each year in LOGOS during Bible Time, and allowing them to lead the congregation with their gifts.

April brought us continued work with the new **EXPLORE** program, including a special dinner and joining the church as well! I began planning in the Spring for our Summer Sunday School program this past year and titled it "Celebrating God's Creation." Each class celebrated something having to do with earth, or water, or recycling ... and celebrating with God has given us. The month of **May** brings so many wonderful memories: Christian Education recognition, Giving 2nd Graders new Bibles, PENTE-COST, and other programs winding down for a summer break ... my calendar was so full for last May, that it was hard to read! It was also the month that my oldest daughter graduated from Penn State with a degree in Music Education, so personally, that was exciting!

June, July, and **August** for some may be down time, but those working at church know it's when we sneak in a vacation (if we can) while beginning to plan for the Fall programs. I hired a new Childcare Coordinator, Christa Jodon, who worked through December 2017. Summer Sunday School happens all summer; we called new LOGOS leadership; and Sunday morning leadership teams began to fall into place with many new folks joining our teaching teams. WPF's cornerstone gathering is *Dinner & Fellowship* on Thursday nights where we pray, dine around table, sing, worship and love reminding students that they are beloved by God and this congregation. Deacons, CAYAM and others provide Sunday meals and Study Space each semester. You all sit near students in worship extending hospitality and welcome. Church Mice stay in touch with folks who grew up at SCPC and are 'away' at college. The College Age and Young Adult Ministry Committee (CAYAM) ensures all of this happens well. Mission Activators David Falk and Lauren Sonsteby (2016-17), and Abby Wolfe and Casey Cook (2017-18) help college students connect with our church and community through education, service and outreach events. WPF last year helped this congregation learn more about hospitality and welcome by focusing on LGBT and Refugee issues.

VOCATIONAL DISCERNMENT GRANT

discernPSU is made possible by a Lilly Endowment Inc. grant received at the end of 2013, making us part of the national Campus Ministry Theological Exploration of Vocation (CMTEV). This year we were awarded a new Sustainability Grant of \$17,500.00, which enables us to carry over the monies remaining from our original 5-year grant, as well as match this grant to continue the ministry of *DiscernPSU* through 2023. Working with Lutheran Campus Ministry @ Penn State, we invite students to consider how their beliefs and values inform the use their gifts and abilities in meaningful work, relationships, volunteering, church, and their connections to the community around them via retreats, on-campus events and service. The grant also funds lunches for faculty and staff to encourage reflection on discernment work with students. I served on the program planning team for the CMTEV annual retreat (for all funded sites) and served as a small group leader at this year's conference, held in Indianapolis last November. YOUNG ADULT MINISTRIES

At least two monthly gatherings provided fellowship for the 20-30-somethings who find SCPC. There are always new challenges that come along each year, but the basics don't really change—I suppose that could get a bit boring but it brings a level of comfort as well. I don know that it is always comforting to know

that we serve together in ministry and that we can gather together to get the work done.

January is always a hectic time for me here in my work at the church with everything that has to be crammed into it. Producing this Annual Report (as well as having to write my own) the annual church statistical reports that need to be submitted, changing over to a new class of church officers and all the paperwork that needs to get to each of them, updating all of the church records, organizing the FISH Winter Retreat registrations and rosters and doing my part to make arrangements for their Mission and Assateague trips ... as well as all of the regular website changes and e-communications and other things that need to be done in a timely manner. I'm always happy to see the calendar turn over to February—and not just because it gets us one month closer to Spring!

Many of the things I do are regular in nature and depend on my keeping up with them. Linda Finley has capably chaired the Ministry Unit again this past year. I have never-ending gratitude for her tireless dedication to our work, as well as Anita Thies and John Graham who also served as Elder on the Membership Ministry Unit—always with encouragement, a smile and a good idea. Many thanks to all of the dedicated members who serve on the Membership Ministry Unit.

<u>Informational Materials</u> -- Another aspect of my work that is rewarding is the production of informational materials for some of our various programs and activities. I continue to enjoy the opportunity to create booklets, brochures, and flyers — that's the fun stuff.

<u>FISH Administration</u> -- We continue to have about 60 registered youth attending the Wednesday evening program, with another handful attending

on a semi-regular basis. Each week there are new faces (or in my case, names). Keeping track of all of these high school students and their parents as well as preparing the program and retreat registration materials and rosters, coordinating Mission Trip and Assateague arrangements, and processing registrations and tuition payments continues to add an interesting dimension to my already full plate. But keeping all of our information in one place in the church database gives us streamlined access to the information when we need it and has been very helpful. Mike Ozaki has cultivated a great group of folks who lead FISH, and we continue to have a strong program available for our church and community high school youth.

<u>Website Administrator</u> -- In an effort to keep up with technology and the social media outlets, I continue to maintain our church website – <u>www.scpresby.org</u>. The website continues to be a useful tool for our congregation and for those who find us on the web. THE ANNUAL REPORTS OF CHURCH ORGANIZATIONS AND MINISTRY UNITS

BOY SCOUT TROOP 32 ~ 2017

Troop 32 has been continuously chartered by the State College Presbyterian Church since 1914. The Troop cur-

rently is comprised of 31 scouts (ranging in ages from 11 to 17), 10 parents participating as committee members, and 17 adults actively serving as Scoutmasters. The Troop is boy run, with advice and counsel provided by adult volunteers. The troop's goal is to improve each scout's leadership skills through fun and challenging activities, enhancing their communication, social and spiritual abilities in the process.

The Troop participated in 24 camping activities during 2017. Typically, the Troop holds one weekend of camping each month as an entire troop, and an additional weekend campout for the "venture patrol", reserved for Scouts at least 13 years of age who have demonstrated the skills and knowledge required to achieve the rank of First Class. Generally, the venture patrol participates in more physically demanding activities that might not be suitable for younger, less advanced Scouts. The Troop participated in both short and long term camping events during the year. Our long term camping events included a week at Resica Falls Scout Reservation in the Poconos, and an additional week for some Scouts at Seven Mountains (our local scout camp). Some Scouts and their families participated in a high adventure canoeing trip in the remote areas of Canada's Algonquin Provincial Park, following the successful trip some members of the Troop took there in the summer of 2016.

The Troop's program this year also included a variety of camping trips, some that included backpacking/hiking, bicycling, canoeing/kayaking and swimming. In June, members of the Troop camped in Maryland and helped raise the flag at Ft. McHenry, the birthplace of our National Anthem, and then presented the colors before a Baltimore Orioles baseball game at Oriole Park at Camden Yards. Our annual Honors Trip was to New York, NY where a group of 21 camped at a Boy Scout camp on Staten Island, and took the ferry in and out of Manhattan. Highlights included having the honor of visiting the wheelhouse of the Spirit of America ferry, seeing the 9/11 Memorial Museum, taking small group tours, and seeing the Rockefeller Center Christmas Tree, which was from State College this year. The Honors Trip is an annual event open to Scouts who have achieved First Class rank and have a minimum of 10 hours of community service during the year.

Each year the Troop has an outstanding record of service to the community, and this year was no exception. In 2017, more than 30 different service projects were supported by the Troop, with a majority of the Scouts and adults participating in more than one project. Some of the service projects were in direct support of State College Presbyterian Church, including workdays to help maintain the church grounds. Other community service supported Seven Mountains Scout Camp and a variety of non-profits throughout the Commonwealth. In total, the Troop provided more than 1,825 community service hours in 2017. While the Scouts adhere to the Scout slogan "Do a good turn daily", these larger community service projects help all who participate practice servant leadership.

The Troop is proud of the outdoor skills, knowledge and achievements demonstrated by its Scouts. The Scouts earned 22 rank advancements in 2017, including two boys advancing to Scout, six each to Tenderfoot, Second Class and First Class, and two to Star. Scouts also earned 102 merit badges in 2017.

The Troop is blessed with outstanding adult leadership. These adults devote much time and effort to providing the Scouts with an outstanding and varied array of programs. Each Scoutmaster and Committee Member has completed youth protection courses and gone through Commonwealth mandated background checks and courses to ensure the safety of the Scouts.

The members of Troop 32 are grateful to the State College Presbyterian Church for its support.

BUILDING AND PROPERTY MINISTRY UNIT ~ 2017

The Building and Property Ministry Unit (B&PMU) directs the maintenance and repair of our

church building and grounds by our custodian staff, contractors, and volunteer church members. Greg Salokangas is our Building Manager/Head Custodian, assisted by Bob Jackson, Evening Custodian, and a Weekend Custodian (Courtney Robinson and Frank Carr in 2017). The general operating budget, along with the Sam and Mary Bayard Endowment Fund, and other designated contributions provide funds for utilities, cleaning supplies and equipment, recurring maintenance inspections, snow removal, property taxes, and maintenance and repair projects.

<u>Routine Maintenance and Repair</u>. During 2017, the B&PMU has overseen numerous recurring repair, renovation, and maintenance projects and continued its efforts to support sustainability and energy efficiency. SCPC is one of less than five Presbyterian churches in the entire state that is a certified as a PC(USA) Earth Care Congregation. During 2017, we completed the following significant projects:

- Replaced four exterior stair railings and the steps leading from the Tower entrance sidewalk to Fraser Street. Also, refurbished the stair railing leading from the Tower entrance to the sidewalk on the W. Beaver Ave. side of the Tower entrance
- Trimmed the large Ginkgo tree on the Fraser St. side of the Sanctuary, the shade tree in front of the Chancel window (so this window is more evenly lite from the outside), and the honey locust tree in the parking lot next to our dumpster
- Completed the renovation of the fire escape
- Installed three exterior LED light fixtures on the alley side of the church.
- Purchased cast-aluminum benches for the Columbarium
- Replace one dogwood tree; removed another
- Removed crabapple tree and stump next to our dumpster in the parking lot
- Installed an on-demand water heater in the second floor lady's restroom
- Replaced four sections of concrete sidewalk along Fraser and W. Beaver

<u>Restoring God's House (RGH)</u>. As a result of the 2016 Capital Campaign, the SCPC congregation donated or pledged \$1,142,447 as of the end of 2017 towards a goal of \$1,000,000 to tackle 10 building renovation projects and establish a B&P maintenance reserve fund. The reserve funds will be used to address other eminent projects, such as A/C replacement, roofing, exterior stone maintenance, and heating and plumbing upgrades. The B&PMU is in the process of revising the SCPC Building and Property Long Range Plan to address projected maintenance and restoration projects beyond the current items which the Restoring God's House campaign is addressing.

The following table shows expenditures as of the end of 2017 on the 10 categories of renovation and repair projects outlined in RGH literature. Bear in mind that the budgets for each category were in some cases based on contractor estimates and were fairly accurate and in other cases were our best guess. When restoring a 103-year-old structure, you will run into hidden expenses. The categories are listed in priority sequence.

<u>SMART</u>. The SCPC Maintenance and Repair Team (SMART) meets the fourth Tuesday of each month from January to November to perform numerous maintenance and repair tasks, and grounds maintenance tasks. Members devoted over 300 man-hours in 2017 to tasks, such as:

- Installed LED light fixtures in approximately 75% of the fixtures in the Education Buildings (Buildings 2 and 3). This was part of the Restoring God's House project which we identified as "self-help"
- Repaired Sanctuary baseboard sections and refinished the back-rest portion of the front 17 rows of pews
- Repainted Fraser Street exterior entrance porch
- Repainted Narthex (Fraser St. entrance room) in new Sanctuary colors
- Cleaned and resealed two teak former Columbarium benches
- Installed insulation in ceiling of some of classrooms on second floor as part of Restoring God's House
- Power-washed and sealed the alley recycle bin deck
- Painted exterior of two fire escape doors
- Trimmed bushes and hedges, fertilized and limed grass, weeded flower beds, and applied weed killer to grass

2017 was a year of exciting changes at State College Presbyterian Church!

The Congregational Fellowship Committee's (CFC) goal is

to provide a variety of fellowship opportunities for the church community. Support is also given to other groups within the church who provide fellowship.

One of the major contributions to the church community is hosting Coffee Hour on Sunday morning so our church members, friends, and visitors enjoy coffee/tea, bagels and other items, along with lively social conversation. Donations are gratefully accepted. Coffee Hour is a wonderful fellowship opportunity and has become an important time for people to socialize following the church service. CFC is supported by many church volunteers who make the Coffee Hour possible each week. In 2017 the annual "tailgate" style Coffee Hour was held August 27th to coincide with welcoming PSU students back. As in the past, special baked goods and fresh fruit complemented the usual bagels, coffee/tea and cold drinks, served in and around the church's front yard as well as the Maneval garden area. The Education Ministry Unit (EMU) is charged by Session to develop, promote, coordinate, and supervise the total Christian Education program of the church in cooperation with the Director of Christian Education. SCPC has vibrant youth programs for infants to college age students, guided by a dedicated team of staff and volunteers who share and continue their faith journeys with the youth in their programs. FINANCIAL AFFAIRS MINISTRY UNIT ~ 2017

The Financial Affairs Ministry Unit (FAMU), under the direction of Session,

is responsible for all the business and financial affairs of the church. This includes the recommendation of policies, development of procedures and oversight of the staff relating to these areas. It reviews and monitors the accounting of all monies received and dispersed by the church, handling investments, preparing goal and operating budgets, payment of employees and maintaining adequate insurance. The unit is also responsible to keep and protect all legal documents, corporate papers, contracts and other effects of legal worth. These activities are handled at our monthly meetings and weekly payment approval sessions.

Each year FAMU develops a goal budget that seeks to accommodate requests received from Ministry Units while preserving the financial integrity of our church. In 2017, we proposed a balanced budget and the results were better than expected. Administrative and ministry unit spending was approximately 96% of plan (~\$22,000), and income was 99% of budget based on the available earned Endowment income as defined in our policy. The net result is, we will have \$33,503 available to support our 2018 annual budget.

Based on the response to the 2018 Stewardship Campaign, the budget

for 2018 projects congregational giving to be in-line with 2017 levels. Budgeted expenditures for 2018 are based on 2017 spending levels with the exception of Personnel expenses that will be increased to cover salary and other personnel costs. With the inclusion of the 2017 surplus, and available Endowment income (per church policy) the 2018 goal budget is balanced.

In 2017, FAMU and the Internal Audit committees agreed to have a modified audit conducted by the accounting firm Baker Tilly. The audit format was recommended by the accounting firm and will provide a cost effective review of the church's finances, key policies, and internet security. This audit will be coordinated by the Internal Audit committee.

In 2017 the members of Financial Affairs Ministry Unit were: Elders Bob Igo, John Ikenberry, Keith Johnson, and Sharon Mortensen; and Deacon Rick Bryant. We would like to thank Rev. Dean Lindsey for his leadership and support. We would also like to thank our outgoing Financial Administrator Sharon Kasting, and new Financial Administrator Michelle Fortin, and Anne Thomas, Assistant Financial Administrator, for their diligence and hard work on behalf of the church.

MEMBERS. From Session, the SFMU had Darrell Velegol (chair), Beth Farmer, and Scott Kretchmar. Other members included Diana Malcom (staff), Mary Jane Kistler, Mary Boutselis, Dee Ann Wylie, Paul Meister, Roger Garthwaite, Jackie Naginey Hook, Jane Butler, and Sharon Manno.

DESCRIPTION and CHARGE. The Spiritual Formation Ministry Unit is charged with providing intentional and recognized leadership, focusing on the overall spiritual welfare of the congregation on behalf of and with Session. Some of the activities include (from the Nov 2016 SFMU meeting, in the previous year's Session):

- Provide assistance to other ministry units with regard to helping meetings remain prayerful and open to the guidance of the spirit
- Support existing small groups and aid in the development of new ones for the purpose of spiritual growth (Small group Facilitator Training, Lenten Small Groups)
- Plan regular offerings, church-wide retreats and other events intended to give the congregation opportunities to grow in prayer and discipleship (Taize, Sabbath Away, Centering Prayer Workshops)
- Maintain e-votionals focusing on contemplation and action, with the possibility of collaborating with other ministry units or committees

MINISTRIES. The SFMU has numerous ministries:

- Centering Prayer (Mary B.): This ministry met weekly, in December 2017 at 12:45 pm Wednesdays
- Devotionals (Mary Jane): These were done during the Lent and Advent seasons, with dozens of member contributions
- Taizè (Diana): T hese times of prayer service for scripture, music, and contemplation occurred the first Thursday of each month from 6:00-7:00 pm
- Sabbath Away (Roger): These occurred monthly, and we started a "Sabbath at Home" at the SCPC Building
- Spiritual Direction (Mary Jane). This was expanded this year, with more Spiritual Directors
- Men's Spirituality (Paul): The Men's Covenant Group (MCG, Paul Meister, John Robison) occurred many Thursdays 7 pm in the upper Tower Room. Also, the tenth annual "Crossings" retreat was held from Thursday evening May 25 through Sunday May 28, 2017. This program was initiated by, is sponsored by, and is carried out by the MCG. The Crossings is an experiential rite of passage based on the teachings of spiritual elders down through the ages
- Women's Spirituality (Jane): This ministry has various aspects. This 2017nov04 was the Women's Retreat at Millbrook Marsh Education Building, a major victory described below. Jane has a small group of women who will join the Wednesdays in the Word group. They will be looking at the Four Loves, CS Lewis and the book of John. Mary Jane Kistler and Mary Boutselis will be offering a Lenten Women's program. It will run weekly during the six weeks of Lent from mid-February through the end of March. The emphasis will be on faith sharing within small groups that will remain consistent throughout the program. Their hope is to offer both daytime and evening group meeting times so as to accommodate the greatest number of participants. The theme is yet to be determined so please stay tuned
- Wandering Women: These hikes, such as in the Patton Woods (2017 May 06), enable women to get out and enjoy God's beauty together. They are very much appreciated by participants.
- Life After Loss (Jackie or Diana). This ministry occurred in early 2017, for those who experienced loss

KEY VICTORIES in 2017

Sponsored by SCPC's Spiritual Formation Ministry Unit, this retreat for adult women of all ages was held 9:00 am 3:00 pm on Saturday, November 4, 2017 in the Millbrook Marsh Education Building. BUDGET. This year we spent slightly under budget, and returned the funds to the Finance Team.

Our Mission Statement: Stay and Play provides a preschool and childcare program where both chil-

dren and adults feel loved, supported and empowered in an environment of compassion, respect and trust. Each child at Stay and Play is treated as a unique creation and is nurtured in his/her diversity and individuality.

A part-time program licensed by the Dept. of Human Services, Stay and Play has been offering affordable quality childcare and preschool programs to families for 31 years. Each year the good reputation of the program continues to bring many new students/families via word of mouth. 14% of our families have been SCPC members this year – which is slightly higher than last year.

We have 5 classes 9:00 am-12:00 pm each day: Age 1 –Tiny Tots, Terrific 2's, Thrillin' 3's, Fabulous 4's and Rainbow 4's (this class meets only MWF). We offer one afternoon class for 3 & 4 year olds, Adventure Afternoons from 12:00-2:45 pm. As a part-time program, we are open September – May and closed for the summer. Tuition rates are reviewed annually to ensure we are able to sustain the high quality of care we currently provide as well as remaining financially comparable to other childcare providers in this community. Tuition rates were not increased for the current school year – which is the 2nd year in a row we did not raise tuition. We continue to be one of the most reasonably priced programs in the area. And again because the enrollment over the past year was high, we were able to meet the budget. We so appreciate all that this church provides to the program - we are truly blessed and will continue to contribute back to the church as our budget allows.

truly blessed and will continue to contribute back to the church as our budget allows.

Our tuition rates for 2017-2018 are as follows: 2 days/week -\$140/month 3 days/week -\$200/month 5 days/week -\$315/month Extended Care –Drop in Care \$16/afternoon and Permanent \$14/afternoon Early Morning drop off varies based on the number of days/week it is used

We accept tuition payments from Childcare Information Services(CCIS) for parents/families who are accepted in the CCIS tuition assistance program. We also continue to provide tuition assistance ourselves to those with a need for financial assistance but do not qualify for the Counties CCIS program. We are currently assisting 7 families this school year. We will continue to work at providing tuition assistance to those in need as much as possible and maintaining confidentiality for these families continues to be essential. There is also a staff benefit of 50% off tuition for staff children to attend S&P – we currently have 7 children covered under this benefit.

We continue to work with the PSU America Reads program which this year provided 4 students for us whom each worked 2 -3 days/week for us. The students are a great compliment to our program.

Last year I did Stay and Play Preschool by the ABC's – This year, how about the 9 months of Stay and Play (a bit like the 12 days of Christmas but don't try to sing it – I'm not that good!). The weird thing about this is that it's a fiscal year – not a school year so this goes out of sink. Jan. through May will be reflective of last school year (2017) and Sept. through Dec. is this school year which is why I'll label each month.

(Jan. 2017) On the fifth month of Stay and Play we had our Winter Music show with Miss Alanna – all our families came to see us sing, dance and play instruments and we even had an art show for them: art from each class on display. (Make sure to stop by the church this Jan. 16th & 17th, 2018 to see this year's art display!). We recognized 5 years of service from Sharon Frost, a teacher – she joins 5 other staff members on 5 or more years at Stay and Play Preschool. Oh, and of course we can't forget that our licensing representative from the Dept. of Human Services came to do our annual licensing review for the program (we passed with flying colors and our license was renewed for another year!).

(Feb. 2017) On the sixth month of Stay and Play the much re was love and excitement in the air. All the classes made valentines and several classes even went to the post office to learn how to mail their valentine's to their families (the postal service workers even invited the children to the back to learn how the mail is sorted- they loved it!). Short month but no short supply of fun and learning or growth and development for our kiddos!

(Mar. 2017) On the seventh month of Stay and Play we had our annual Musical Fieldtrip – going to 5 different stations of instruments throughout the building listening to and learning more about instruments and music from our parent and church staff volunteers. Heidi Lynne Photography was in for our annual photo shoots with her. Explored Seed germination, our five senses, art - some even made self-portraits and explored similarities and differences in each other.

(Apr. 2017) On the eighth month of Stay and Play we had Easter Egg Hunts and spring activities starting in full swing. Planting flowers and veggies, watching frogs grow from a tadpole (it's amazing to see their legs begin to form!), smelling skunkweed from Miss Valerie's farm (not as amazing) and enjoying the PSU Kappa Kappa Gamma student volunteers in our classrooms each week. We also held our first on-site fundraiser for Stay and Play called the Leap for Learning. Each child participated and "leaped" for donations to our program: fun was shared for all! The advisory team agreed to try to make this an annual event fundraiser it was so successful and highly rated by all families.

(May 2017) On the ninth month of Stay and Play we stayed just as busy as all other 8 months of the school year! We got the opportunity to have our vision checked by North Central Sight Services (2 year olds and up - Crazy that they can check these young children and see if there may be a vision concern

already!) – over the past 4 years we have had at least 1 child each year who we've

learned needed glasses. We had Parent/Teacher conferences to inform parents of their child's progress over the year. We had our second music experience with families and an art show, we celebrated with a S&P Recognition Sunday (thank you for that wonderful recognition!), the 4's classes held a wonderful "Moving On" ceremony for their children and we ended the year with an All school family picnic at Circleville park.

Over the summer months of June – August, the Administration were busy with much preparation for the upcoming school year and hiring new staff. The school may be closed, however the office work does not ever stop! Working to understand and better use the new financial program, enrollment for new students (paperwork galore!), tours for potential new students/families, helping teachers with preparations, ordering supplies, working with other agencies to prepare for the coming school year... and on and on it goes.

(Sept. 2017) On the first month of Stay and Play We were all getting to know new friends and teachers including Mr. Paul our new music teacher (substituting for Alanna Leicht for the year while she is living in London with her family) – everyone LOVES Mr. Paul. Began a new enrollment process with our new financial program – there is always a learning curve with these type of updates! Gathered information to make sure we cold put together an accurate school directory for everyone.

(Oct. 2017) ON the second Month of Stay and Play Fall was in full affect and we all loved the Falloween Festival put on for us by the PSU RPTM class one late Oct. morning that culminated in our annual Halloween Parade around the building. We had a Fun Family Movie Night one Friday evening – watching Monsters University – even had a popcorn machine providing tons of popcorn for those in attendance.

(Nov. 2017) On the third month of Stay and Play we had our Fall Parent/Teacher Conferences, school picture days and hosted a Scholastic Book Fair (all in the same week!). We also hosted a Family Fun Music Concert for S&P families as well as anyone from the community – a Scottish harpist and a Canadian guitarist shared their incredible musical talents with all who attended.

(Dec. 2017) On the fourth month of Stay and Play we had the child Christmas energy, excitement and anticipation ALL month! Teachers were tired and ready for a break even though it was amazingly fun! There were Christmas Story re-enactments, Christmas caroling to the SCPC staff, Christmas cookies and gingerbread baking, making presents for our parents, doing good deeds for others through our Advent Calendar Good deeds count down to Christmas, playing in the snow at Sidney Friedman park, collecting and shopping for angel tree gifts, ... And this is just some of what we did in Dec. on top of learning a lot of the normal school stuff like every other month!

There were 9 Full months of learning and excitement that culminated at the end of the school year with great happiness and success. We look forward to the same success over the next 9 school months!

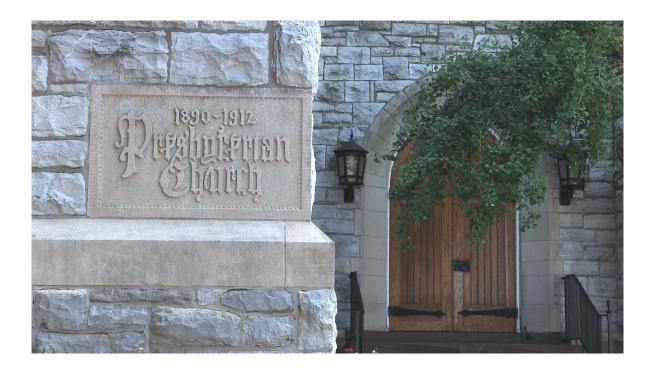
REPORT OF THE INTERNAL AUDIT COMMITTEE ~ 2017

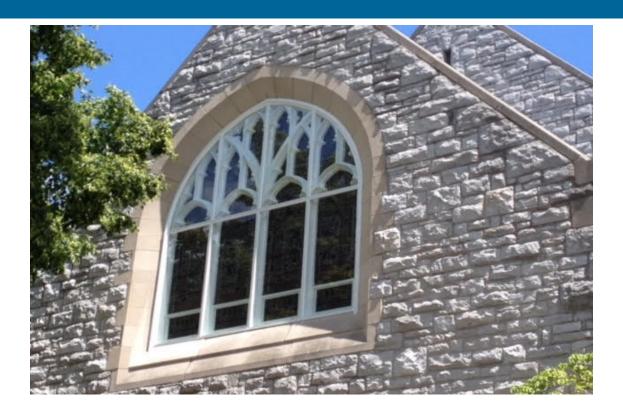
