

Spiritual Disciplines - Lenten Study

A 6-week study on Spiritual Disciplines began on Monday, February 27 and will continue through April 3. The Study will meet on **Monday mornings at 11:00 AM in Room 10 and on Zoom.**

Pastor John Porter, Associate Pastor Allison Maus, and Director of Youth Ministry Reed Dressler will lead six individual sessions looking at fasting, study, service and submission, simplicity, meditation and prayer, and solitude. The good news of Jesus Christ is that through him we are liberated from attitudes and ingrained patterns of behavior that degrade and demean the glory of God revealed in all people and every element of creation. Though the gospel message about transformation is simple, our experience of transformation is not. Scripture teaches that we are not capable of transforming ourselves. It is by God that we are transformed and set free from sin.

Spiritual disciplines are practices that help bring us into God's transforming presence. Drawing on a variety of resources including Richard Foster's Celebration of Discipline, our study will consider the nature of these spiritual practices and how we can move deeper and more fully into the life of freedom that we have received through Christ.





Adult Opportunities in March

March 5 - Spiritual Disciplines: Guidance and Celebration, led by John Porter. Westminster Hall.

Continuing from the previous week, Rev. Porter will lead an Adult Exploration hour covering four classical spiritual disciplines that we practice together as a community. Richard Foster in "Celebration of Discipline" asserts "The classical Disciplines of the spiritual life call us to move beyond the surface of living into the depths... God intends [them] to be for ordinary human beings: people who have jobs, who care for children, who wash dishes and mow lawns. In fact, the Disciplines are best exercised in the midst of our relationships." In this session we will look at the last two of the twelve spiritual disciplines Foster covers in the text: Guidance, & Celebration. Each session will be accessible to those who don't attend both.

March 12 - Reflections on my work as a missionary in Haiti, led by Connie Curilla. Westminster Hall.

What does it mean to be called to a life of service? Join Connie Curilla as she shares about her lifelong work as a missionary in Haiti, including what led her to this line of work, what was accomplished, what work remains, and some surprises along the way.

Gabbie, Cole, Caitlin, and Bella will be with us until PSU is out, and then back again in the FALL.



The Social Justice and Mission Team invites you to help State College Presbyterian Church support disaster response near and far in two different ways.



The One Great Hour of Sharing collection is open during Lent. This PCUSA-wide collection supports three programs, Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People. Each works in a different way to serve individuals and communities in need, together providing safety, sustenance, and hope. Post-earthquake crisis response in Türkiye and Syria are among the current projects of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. Watch for One Great Hour of Sharing envelopes in the pews, or simply use the memo line on your check, or the "other" designation line on your online donation to SCPC to indicate OGHS.





The Social Justice and Mission team is also sponsoring a Church World Service Disaster Relief Bucket assembly. The assembly party will happen in the Social Hall_after Education/Exploration Hour on April 23, Earth Day Sunday. We will collect items for the buckets from now through April 15th. Our goal will be to fill 50 buckets to be sent to Church World Service to help people clean up after disasters of all kinds. Won't you be a part of this project?

We want this to be an intergenerational activity from start to finish. FISH will be involved in assembly or checking and sealing the buckets, and one member is creating the Signup Genius for us. Would you like to help organize materials before that Sunday, or perhaps staff a station on the bucket-filling assembly line, where there will be opportunities for seated volunteers? Or would your small group like to provide snacks or music? Please let Cricket know, and she will get word to our Bucket Project team.

You may remember that the list of things that goes in a bucket is very specific, so we will have a Signup Genius list to make sure we have everything we need, in the right amounts, for all 50 buck-

ets. _Items can be shopped for locally, or ordered to be delivered right to the church office._ The processing fee for each bucket is \$3. Monetary donations to cover that cost can be made to SCPC memo: buckets.

Calling a Senior Pastor: Confidentiality and Candidates

When the Pastor Visioning Team finishes its work and submits its report to the Session and the Committee on Ministry, the Session will call a congregational meeting. At this meeting the team will present its report and ask the congregation to endorse it as the vision which will guide the selection of a Senior Pastor. And at this meeting the Congregational Nominating Committee will present a slate of members for election as a Pastor Nominating Committee to conduct the search. Like all leaders in the Presbyterian system they are not elected to simply represent the congregation, but to earnestly apply the vision statement endorsed as they seek a candidate who they believe is called by God to fill office of Senior Pastor at this time.

The PNC will consider candidates who will be matched with our congregation through a nationwide system that includes information about positions to be filled and ministers who are seeking a new call. For each candidate they will receive a Personal Information Form. This PIF is the denominational equivalent of a minister's resume. They may consider candidates who request consideration by submitting their PIF to the committee directly. The committee will review these PIF's, observe candidates leading worship, conduct interviews, and ultimately host on site visits as they narrow down their selection. They are required to practice confidentiality concerning the identity of the candidates under consideration. They will refrain from discussing specific details about the candidates that they are considering until they are ready to present a final candidate. Only after a final candidate has accepted the invitation to come before the congregation will the committee share the candidate's name, a summary of their qualifications, and a short biographical statement. These details will be shared with the congregation shortly before a worship service at which the candidate will be presented and deliver a sermon. Immediately following worship the congregation will then have an opportunity to elect the candidate to the office and approve the terms of call.

The PNC will be engaged in conversation with multiple candidates at one time. Many of these conversations may end with candidates withdrawing themselves from consideration for a variety of reasons. As a result it will not be possible to confidently project a particular timeline for when they will have a candidate to present to the congregation. They will need our prayerful support and patience to do a thorough search for the best possible candidate. As the active search is conducted you can anticipate more information about the process. It should be evident in our activities and programs that the ministry of State College Presbyterian Church has and will continue during the search, though with the anticipation of and preparations for receiving a new Senior Pastor.

African Tradition to African American Art


Many people wanted to learn more about the artists featured in Heather McCune Bruhn's Adult Education presentation "African Tradition to African American Art" — and many who weren't able to be there will enjoy connecting with the images, too. Use the links below (and your own Internet explorations) to explore and learn more! Many thanks to Heather for sharing her presentation and these links.

South Carolina artist and storyteller Natalie Daise has a presence on instagram (@gullahmama), as well as a website with a blog, a place to view and buy her art, or book her as a speaker or storyteller. Some of her wonderful collard green art shows in both places. The extraordinary paintings and sculpture that Heather shared with us at Adult Ed appear in the Myrtle Beach Museum press release about her exhibit there. See both the top of the page, and the scrolling slideshow at the bottom. This website has lots of information about active, living foodways (food+culture) that stolen peoples brought with them across the Atlantic (there are recipes).

Painter and sculptor Kehinde Wiley's website opens with a photo of him in the studio that is a wonderful reference to his portraiture references to Old Masters' works. Use the Menu to go to Works, where you can find thematic slideshows with a short introduction at the front of each group. Under Projects, you will find some sculpture. His shop supports Black Rock Senegal, an artist in residence program founded by Wiley. Both Black Rock Senegal and Kehinde Wiley are on Instagram (@blackrocksenegal, @kehindewiley). Heather was at the Virginia Museum of Art in Richmond for a Kehinde Wiley show, and her slides showed one work that they had acquired that is now hung in a gallery with historical art that Wiley references, where we can more easily see the conversation across time and culture, instead of in a contemporary art gallery. His artist's talk from that show was recorded and can be viewed. This 15 minute interview with the artist in the galleries highlights those conversations between his work and the art that was typical of an art history class covering European masters. His sculpture Rumors of War — and its context in Richmond with other large, bronze sculptures of men on horses along Monument Ave.— is pictured and discussed in this NPR article. The title "Rumors of War," is drawn from Matthew 24:6 "You will hear of wars and rumors of wars, but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come."

The Parisian exhibit about Mardi Gras culture and costume in New Orleans that Heather shared, *Black Indians de la Nouvelle -Orléans*, is <u>discussed and pictured in this blog</u>, and at <u>the museum site</u>. There is more discussion of the <u>traditions and the nomenclature in this article</u> from the major New Orleans newspaper, *The Times Picayune*. Learn more about the extraordinary <u>Josephine Baker</u> from the online collection of the <u>National Museum of African American History & Culture</u>, or read or listen to <u>two</u> (quite <u>different</u>) NPR articles from November 2021, reporting her induction into the Panthéon Mausoleum in Paris.
