### **Director of Music Ministry Update**



The Personnel Committee was charged with the important task of recruiting and hiring a new Director of Music Ministry this spring. Our first task was assuring coverage of the summer worship music including arranging for an organist(s) and special ensembles. This work was done in conjunction with the worship committee and currently we have covered all the services through Labor Day. Special thanks to Anne Layng and Dick Bundy for orchestrating this big job.

In April, the Personnel Committee, led again by Dick Bundy, solicited and accepted members to form a visioning team for the leadership needed for our music ministry. This team represented a wide range of ages and a variety of involvement in the musical life of SCPC. Through their diligent efforts, they crafted a description that forms the basis of the search pa-

rameters as we go about filling this vital position.

Three primary observations became clear during these sessions: the enrichment each participant received from the many musical opportunities available to the congregation, the essential role that music ministry plays in the overall mission of the church, and the extensive range of responsibilities and talents Ned shared with us in his long and meaning-ful tenure.

The visioning team shared their description for an ideal candidate with the Personnel Committee and completed its work. Our thanks to this team led by Dick and consisting of Paul Mortimore, Donna Korzick, Jennifer Tothero, Carol Graham, Tori Robinson, and Luca Snyder.

The Personnel Committee has met several times this summer to not only finalize the job description and prepare the advertisement, but also to research various organizations such as choir colleges, organist guilds, and choral programs where we can target the ad. Currently we hope to have the job posted by the end of August.

As with the pastor search, the Music Ministry Director search committee is separate from the visioning team. Formation of this committee is in its final stages, and we hope to have our first meeting before the end of July to acquaint the committee with the description and procedures for interviewing candidates.

In the meantime, we must assume that the new director will not be in place when our fall program schedule starts. Last week we made the decision to move forward with searching for an interim LOGOS worship coordinator and an interim choir director to cover these two critical aspects of the church's music ministry. We have several leads in these areas and will have more information soon.

If you would like further information about the process, please feel free to contact the church office via email and they will put you in touch with a personnel committee member or ask us directly. We welcome the feedback! The committee is Barbara Cox (chair), Dick Bundy, Scott Sesler, and Laura Robinson. Please keep us and the search committee in your prayers as we look to find the leadership we need to sustain meaningful ministry through music at State College Presbyterian Church.

### Wandering Women August Evening Walk

A ll women of the church are invited to join the Wandering Women walk on Friday, August  $18^{th}$  from 5:30 to 7 pm. We will be trying something new – a short evening walk with the option of chatting over a drink afterwards. We will explore the nature trails of the Boal Estate in Boalsburg, home of the Boal Mansion and the Boal Barn Playhouse. The estate is a remarkable oasis of trees, streams, and birds in the middle of a town setting, although we can expect some noise from the nearby roads. Our walk will be a loop of less than 2 miles, mostly over flat ground with mulched paths.

We will meet on Friday, August 18<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 pm at Blue Spring Park in Boalsburg. There is parking beside the park along Wagner Road, at the intersection with West Pine Street. #### Out of the Cold – Successes, Challenges, and Learning More

During the two weeks when this congregation hosted the overnight shelter for Out of the Cold (8:00 pm to 7:30 am), 64 volunteers and donors provided 280 dinners, 140 breakfasts,



308 coffees, and so many greetings and conversations. That doesn't begin to count all who were offering prayers.

Several different guests, independently and on different days, let me know that they felt particularly welcomed here. Space to sleep and good food are incredibly important. Real warmth, welcome, and companionship, even for a short time, are food for the spirit. Thank you for all you did to welcome our neighbors.

# As we prepared and hosted, Cricket Hunter (SCPC Mission Associate) fielded lots of good questions about the program and its evolution.

**How many guests are there?** The overnight program is capped at 25-28 due to code restrictions and staff limitations. The day shelter is open to anyone who does not have a solid address. Drop-in guests can receive mail (one needs an address to apply for aid and for jobs), get a shower, do a bit of laundry, and eat lunch, as well as receive support from staff.

Wait, there is a <u>waitlist</u> for the overnight shelter?! Since we hosted in the summer of last year, the waitlist has varied from just under 20 people to nearly 60 (when the pandemic eviction restrictions were lifted). It generally hovers around 40. People are often surprised by these numbers, since they don't notice homeless neighbors in the ways that we might when we visit cities large enough to have subways or big bus depots. Many Out of the Cold guests are busy during the day with short-term or low-paying jobs, and with trying to manage mental and physical health issues that are a challenge to manage even for patients with predictable housing and a stable income.

Over the course of a year, 90% or more of the overnight guests are from or tied to Centre County, and <u>every month</u> a few guests are able to move out and into more stable housing. This kind of success is possible because Out of the Cold works closely with partnering agencies, including Centre Helps, Interfaith Human Services, Centre Safe, and Housing Transitions.

The overflow is still a huge concern. The program started in 2011 as a volunteer-only, cold months only program after an unhoused man who had been living in his tent in Bellefonte froze to death.

Why did it feel calmer and easier this time? Near the end of last summer, Out of the Cold hired its very first Executive Director. Previously, there had been a Program Director, and last summer, the Board President was serving dual duty as the Interim Director (along with her regular job at Calvary!). The Executive Director, Jordan Taylor, has worked hard on staff stability, and structures that make it easier for staff to work together, such as always having two staff people on duty, and staggering the shift changes, for more communication. Many of the staff people who were serving during our hosting had been with the program for more than a year. Guests are now invited to take part in morning chores to keep spaces clean (our morning volunteers can tell you that that made a huge difference!) Each month, the Executive Director provides a set of quick facts to the Board of Directors to serve as a snapshot of the month, which is incredibly helpful for board members tracking overall needs.

#### Why isn't Out of the Cold in the building they purchased in 2021?

Last year when we hosted, the only delay for renovating the Out of the Cold building at 318 S. Atherton was waiting for code approvals. As it turned out, that delay was good, since they learned that they would need a bigger sewer line (not surprising, given the change in building use!). By delaying renovation until this spring/summer, they were able to time their sewer enlargement to the DOT and Borough work on South Atherton, saving more than \$10,000. They will be able to move back into the building as soon as renovations are complete. The date is a construction timeline, but we can be sure it will be sometime late summer to mid fall.

#### What is next for the program?

Individuals and congregations will continue to support the program with lunches, dinners, volunteers, and visitors, as well as financial donations that help support utilities, staff salaries, and other costs, with grants helping to pay loans. We are not yet sure what shape the congregations' meal-and-visiting support will take but we are exploring, and will let you know. Those who have been able to volunteer and have conversations with guests in the last couple of years can tell you: every guest has a story, and most are a mix of misfortune and strength.

Watch for what we hope will be a short series of Adult Ed programs on housing and homelessness in our region in the year to come.
