First Steps: Calling a New Pastor

We are taking the first steps towards finding and bringing a minister to State College Presbyterian

Church. One of my goals is to keep you informed about the process and our progress along the way. As we begin, I would like to share with you the steps involved in calling a new pastor. Just as we each possess different spiritual gifts and have developed particular skills; each ordained minister brings unique gifts and skills to pastoral service. Before the active search begins, we must clearly articulate what kind of pastoral leadership we will need from a Senior Pastor.

The Session has appointed a Pastor Visioning Team of seven members to discern and articulate the kind of pastoral leadership that God is calling into to ministry with us at this place and time. The members of the Pastor Visioning Team are Mitch Kirsch (Chair), Rob Hufford, Laura Essinger-Hileman, Jillian Rounsville, Cam Richardson, Katherine Allen, and Brady Wassom. This group will seek God's will in this matter by considering the vision for our ministry, the resources available, by listening to our staff, members, partners in ministry and neighbors, and through prayer and reflection on scripture. They will prepare and present a report describing the leadership that we will look for in a Senior Pastor.

The Pastor Visioning Team will present the report to the congregation for endorsement at a congregational meeting. The report will serve as the guide for an active search for a candidate that fits this description. Having completed their work, the Pastor Visioning Team will be dismissed with thanks and the responsibility for conducting the active search for the candidate will be entrusted to a Pastor Nominating Committee elected by the congregation.

The Pastor Nominating Committee will seek eligible candidates, review their profiles, observe them leading worship, and consider their experience. They will conduct interviews with a select number of candidates. The Presbytery will vet these candidates. They will select a candidate they believe God is calling to serve as the next Senior Pastor of State College Presbyterian Church and extend an invitation to formally seek election by the congregation to the position. The Pastor Nominating Committee will introduce the candidate to the congregation shortly before a worship service at which they will preach. Members will have the opportunity to confirm the selection of the Pastor Nominating Committee by electing the candidate at a congregational meeting held following the worship service.

I will be facilitating the work of the Pastor Visioning Team. I will support the Pastor Nominating Committee but will not be involved with the active search. One of our goals is to keep you informed about the process and our progress along the way. Please pray for the Pastoral Visioning Team and look for periodic articles in the PresbyPost and Weekly updates.

Update on the Betio Church

With the help of gifts from our members, the planning for the new sanctuary in Betio, on the island of Tarawa, Republic of Kiribati, in the Central Pacific, is now proceeding. Our gift came to \$23,000 in Australian dollars which are used for their local currency. Lay leader Tabotabo Auatabu sent this update:

"Mauri (that is the greeting in their language) to our Brothers and Sisters in Christ in the Presbyterian Church,

As always, we deeply appreciate the assistance for our church. I just want to give an update on what is happening on the ground.

- 1. Fence has been built by church members.
- 2. Our Architect has recently met his counterpart in Australia who will be responsible for the completion of our design.
- 3. Once the design is completed, probably before the end of the year, we will confirm the cost of materials which will be needed and before shipment of such.
- 4. As advised from our designer, the chapel will be built with prefab materials.

I will keep you posted on further progress.

The Christmas Candlelight Service

Its Theme and Variations

In December 1927, The State College Presbyterian Church Choir presented its first Candlelight Service. No program exists, no record of who took part. We know only that Harriet Holben was the director and Max Krumrine was the organist. It must have been an instant success, for within two years there were elaborate decorations, worked on by Hilda and Alice Thompson, members of one of our founding families.

Pew candelabra were installed in the middle of every other row of pews, totaling sixteen candelabra with five tapers each. Six freestanding candelabra were at the front of the sanctuary. Since dripless candles were not yet available, a massive cleanup of wax followed each service. This truly was a candlelight affair, offered as a late afternoon Christmas vesper service by a choir of fifteen members. It was soon to be enhanced by two large Christmas trees at the front of the sanctuary.

Four o'clock vesper services continued with the size of the choir reaching twenty-three in 1938. Music included cantatas, anthems, soloists and instrumentalists Organ, piano and violin selections appeared regularly. In 1939, the program began to be scheduled as an evening worship service. Anthems, carols, Scripture and prayer were embellished by newly gifted tower chimes. In 1941, the service took on added significance as war was declared and the church was funding a major building project. The twenty-five voice choir presented a varied program of trios, quartets and soloists in addition to their regular anthems.

The focus changed in the 1940's to include the youth choirs and the group was referred to as The Combined Choirs. This included thirty-two adults and thirty juniors. It was divided into a Men's Choir, a Girls' Choir and a Combined Choir. Still an evening service, it began to be broadcast in 1949, with a radio narrator and the senior high Westminster Fellowship reading Scripture. While some services were dedicated to former choir members, the 1950 service was given in honor of the five living charter members of the church.

A choir mother was appointed and a Cherub Choir formed as the program expanded. By 1954, there was a Church Choir, a Cherub Choir, a Women's Chorus, a Men's Chorus and a Girls' Choir. Needless to say, this proved a bit too much, and the next year there were no youth choirs due to a drastic cutback.

In 1959, a Crusader Choir of juniors appeared and became an integral part of the Candlelight Service. This choir presented a fifteen minute offering of carols prior to the service.

A Day of Thanksgiving and Praise

In 1863, Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of November a "day of Thanksgiving and Praise," making annual an inconsistent national tradition. George Washington had issued two Thanksgiving proclamations, in 1789 and 1795; Thomas Jefferson zero. Some states had celebrated Thanksgiving, while others had not. Even the dates of celebration had differed.

Throughout the Civil War, the Union and Confederate States would use competing Thanksgiving proclamations to lift public morale. Many of the Thanksgiving sermons held by the Presbyterian Historical Society are pointed responses to such decrees. After the capture of Fort Sumter on April 13, 1863, the president and congress of the Confederate States declared June 13 a day of National Thanksgiving. In *The Battle of Fort Sumter: a Discourse Preached on the Day of National Fasting, Thanksgiving and Prayer*, the Reverend Thomas Smyth told the First Presbyterian Church of Charleston, SC, that, "On this occasion, we will restrict our argument, and your attention, to the glorious victory of Fort Sumter, considered, first, as a signal proof of the powerful providence of God; and, secondly, as a pledge and promise of God's continued providence and protection over us."

A month later, after another Confederate victory at Manassas, VA, and another declaration of Thanksgiving, the Reverend George D. Armstrong found more evidence of divine support for the Southern cause. In The Good Hand of God Upon Us: A Thanksgiving Sermon Preached on Occasion of the Victory of Manassas, July 21st, 1861, Armstrong told the Presbyterian Church in Norfolk, VA, that, "Through 'the good hand of God upon us,' in making mad our enemies, we stand this day a thoroughly united people, with none feeble of purpose in all our hosts; and the foul aspersion attempted to be cast upon our fair fame in calling us 'covenant-breakers, traitors, rebels' recoils upon its authors." Militarily, the Confederate States dominated the first two years of the War. Only with the Union victories at Gettysburg and Vicksburg in 1863 did the Union cause seem the more likely to prevail. On August 6, Lincoln made his first declaration of a day of Thanksgiving for that year.

Northern Presbyterian ministers used the opportunity to rally a beleaguered people behind the Union cause. The Reverend Frederick T. Brown's sermon Giving Thanks for Union Victories Preached in Bridge Street Presbyterian Church, Georgetown, D.C., is one conciliatory example. "Divided, made two, we are ruined," claimed Rev. Brown, "and will be the scorn and contempt of the world. But, one, undivided, and united, we may fearlessly face the world, and go on in that career of progress in which we have started....till that one word American shall make the bad tremble and the good rejoice wherever spoken the world over." The Civil War would end two years later, but the newly reunited nation would continue to celebrate Thanksgiving each fall, giving gratitude for what it has achieved in times of plenty and loss. In 1863, the songwriter William Muhlenberg wrote "The President's Hymn: Give Thanks All Ye People." Its words continue to capture the spirit of Thanksgiving today:

Give Thanks all ye people, Give thanks to the lord, Alleluias of freed, with joyful accord: Let the East and the West, North and South roll along, Sea, mountain and prairie, One thanksgiving song

Christmas Kindnesses

By the time you get this newsletter, we will have just finished collecting **Christmas Cards** to provide warm wishes to people who are incarcerated in Centre County. Many, many thanks to all who participated in this all-ages service opportunity! Centre Peace reports that these cards are sometimes the only mail a person receives all year, and they are deeply appreciated. The **Angel Tree** will happen again this year, under the leadership of the Deacons. Watch the Weekly Update email – and the bridge – for details. The Social Justice and Mission Team is working with them to add angels that will help fund **four nights of Christmastime housing for Out of the Cold at a local hotel.** These nights provide some much-needed holiday respite for both clients and OOTC staff. 15 rooms are needed, at a cost of \$30 per person (\$60 per room) per night.

Prayers and relief for those afflicted by disaster. We know that many of you have been praying with us as we hear news of floods, hurricanes, earthquakes, and wildfires. Right at the end of September, in the wake of the flooding of our near-neighbors in Kentucky, the Social Justice and Mission Team disbursed \$1500 from the Powers Fund to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance to respond. PDA maintains prayers for hard times, signups for newsletters, service opportunities, and a donation link at pda.pcusa.org.

The Peace and Global Witness Offering we supported portions funds to be used for peacemaking work locally, regionally, and farther afield. The Social Justice and Mission Team designated the Jana Marie Foundation to be the recipient of SJMT's 2021 and

2022 collections. SJMT feels that the Jana Marie Foundation's work to grow a more connected community, with more open dialogue, and more mental health resilience aligns beautifully with the goals of the Peace and Global Witness offering, and addresses concerns that currently add to the needs addressed by many of the agencies we already support, such as Out of the Cold, and CVIM. The mission of Jana Marie Foundation is to harness the power of dialogue and creative expression to spark conversations, build connections and promote the mental well-being among young people and their communities.

The CROP Walk supports our State College Area Food Bank as well as Church World Service's food security efforts around the globe. In addition to this congregations' prayers and shoe leather supported the walk, we raised about \$2200. Walkers enjoyed a celebratory meal on the front lawn afterwards – also thanks to the Deacons. November 20, Westminster Hall. Small Island, Big Song, Part 1


