
Saturday, March 6

**This Sunday we wrap up our survey of
Black Composers for Black History Month**

Florence Beatrice Smith Price (1887-1953) was born April 9, 1887 in Little Rock, Arkansas. She studied composition and organ at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston and afterwards taught in the music departments at Shorter College in Arkansas (1906-1910), and Clark University in Georgia (1910-1912). Among her most famous compositions is the *Symphony in E Minor* which won the Wanamaker Prize in 1931. She was the first African American woman to have composition played by a major orchestra. Price died on June 3, 1953 of a stroke in Chicago, Illinois.

Dr. Robert A. Harris is a composer, conductor, and music educator born and raised in Detroit. Harris attended Wayne State University, the Eastman School of Music, Michigan State University, and the Aspen Music School. He has served as a professor and choral director at many top colleges, most notably Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music,

So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit.' 9Nicodemus said to him, 'How can these things be?' 10Jesus answered him, 'Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

11 'Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. 12If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? 13No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. 14And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, 15that whoever believes in him may have eternal life.
