Weekly Congregational Prayer Meeting—Tuesdays at Noon

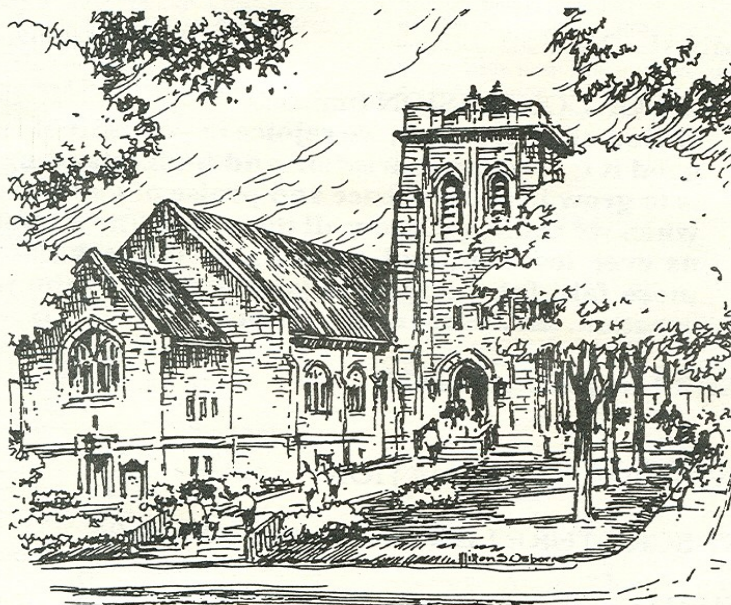

Composers of the Prelude and Postlude:

Adolphus Hailstork (b. 1941) is an American composer and educator. He grew up in Albany, New York, where he studied violin, piano, organ, and voice. He holds degrees from Howard University, Manhattan School of Music, and Michigan State University, and studied at the American Institute at Fontainebleau with Nadia Boulanger. His awards include a Fulbright fellowship in 1987, Hailstork is professor emeritus of music and eminent scholar at Old Dominion University in Norfolk Virginia. His composition “Fanfare on ‘Amazing Grace’” was performed as part of the prelude music at the recent inauguration of President Biden.

Carl W. Haywood (b. 1949) is a native of Portsmouth, Virginia. He holds degrees from Norfolk State University, Southern Methodist University, and the University of Southern California. He is currently Director of Choral Activities at Norfolk State University. Haywood served as organist/choir director at Grace Episcopal Church, Norfolk and has served on the Liturgical Commission for the Diocese of Southern Virginia and the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music for the Episcopal Church of America. At the Kennedy Center, he served as a National Conductor and National Chair for the 105 Voices of History, the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Choir.
