

**Weekly Congregational Prayer Meeting—Tuesdays at Noon**

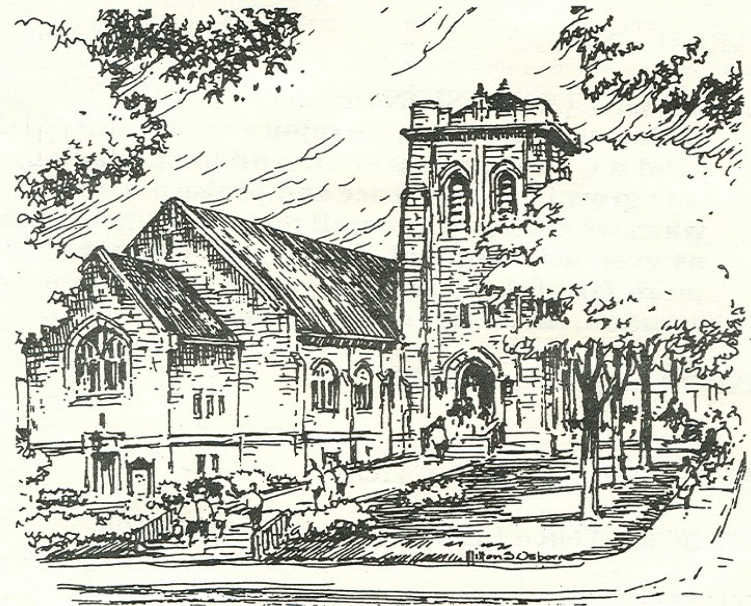

21 They went to Capernaum; and when the Sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. <sup>22</sup>They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. <sup>23</sup>Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, <sup>24</sup>and he cried out, ‘What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth?
